2019 was another amazing year for the Metropolitan Arts Council (MAC). Our cash income and earnings were an all-time high again, with \$1,941,532 raised for our programs and services. With in-kind donations, our annual budget exceeded well over \$2 million for the third consecutive year. MAC also awarded \$391,887 in grants for cultural initiatives throughout Greenville County. Our Endowment for the Arts had a balance of \$1,800,692 in cash and earnings as of December 31.

Project Support Grants

MAC's grants program is the backbone of the organization, as it ensures a major stream of operating and project support to individual artists, arts organizations and arts education programs throughout Greenville. The impact of these grants on the overall cultural environment of Greenville is significant. With a MAC grant, individual artists further develop their craft and launch career goals, and presenting companies and schools are able to expand their arts-related programs and services. In 2019, MAC awarded \$155,886.50 in project support for cultural initiatives throughout Greenville County. One of MAC's primary goals is to expand the grants program every year to support the many worthwhile endeavors throughout the Greenville area.

Artisphere

ARTISPHERE (1) for the commission and installation of a new work of public art in celebration of Artisphere's 15th year. The work, *Spindle*, was created by Blessing Hancock and placed in the Village of West Greenville and (2) for the juried exhibit, *Artists of the Upstate* which features artists living and working within a 35-mile radius of Greenville.

AUGUSTA CIRCLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL for the annual Cultural Arts Week (Austria) event promoting cultural appreciation for other countries. The week included activities in the classroom and outdoors, related arts, guest artist performances and food tastings.


LISA BARKSDALE to teach at a seminar on voice technique in Manila, Philippines.

BELLAZEN ELECTRIC STRINGS for a recording and release of a new full album, including a CD performance/ release party during Artisphere, which was free and open to the public.

NATHAN BERTLING for a solo show in New York City at Dacia Gallery. The grant assisted with the purchase of materials for the exhibition.

BIKE WALK GREENVILLE for the creation and placement of a bronze sculpture on the Prisma Swamp Rabbit Trail. The work was created by local artist Charles Pate, Jr. The process also involved the participation of Lakeview Middle School students.

BRIDGES TO A BRIGHTER FUTURE AT FURMAN for help with a four-week summer program for teenagers to attend workshops with Glenis Redmond, which included a Poetry Slam and printed versions of their stories. These 75 students are all part of an under-represented population in higher education.

BRYSON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL for the purchase of a pentatonic-toned sculpture for the 1st and 2nd grade playground and a tubular chime for 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students.

NICK BURNS for the creation of 25 murals in partnership with 25 non-profits. The designs for the 25 murals will be compiled into one art piece on display at the Greenville Center for Creative Arts in August 2020.

CAROLINA DANCE COLLABORATIVE for a dance showcase performance at Hampton Station, Taylors Mill and the Village of West Greenville in connection with the surrounding art galleries and brewery. The showcase was aimed to reach new audiences who may not have experienced professional dance.

CAROLINA MUSIC MUSEUM for hosting the Marching 101 Band from SC State University to present a lecture to Greenville County School band students on the history of band programs as well as instruction on their performance steps. A performance with all participating students was free and open to the public.

CARRIE CREECH for attending a workshop with Sean O'Connell at Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC. The workshop expanded the artists' techniques and skills of her craft, in addition to providing her with vital professional connections to help launch her career.

CHICORA VOICES for new chorus shirts for use in public performances. The new shirts provided a consistent appearance and served as a promotion and marketing campaign for the chorus.

LCCRUELL for the production of a supernatural/southern folk horror film, *Sacrifice*, shot on location in Greenville.

APRIL DAUSCHA for the development of new work, promotional materials and installation displays for her first solo exhibition, *Clothed in a Mantue of Virginity*, at Furman University.

KEITH DAVIS for the production of a second recording of the Keith Davis Trio (with Ron Brendle and Justin Watt). The CD included original compositions by the applicant. Recording took place at Old House Studio in Charlotte, NC.

EMRYS FOUNDATION for production of the annual *Emrys Journal* (Vol. 37), which publishes best fiction, poetry and creative non-fiction submissions from local to international, established and emerging writers.

FINE ARTS CENTER for a student run, project-based learning initiative in reading and creative writing which includes a guest artist, a two-day craft lecture, a workshop

GOLD STAR YOUTH to provide scholarships to 50 low-income students for ballroom dancing classes.

GREENVILLE CENTER FOR CREATIVE ARTS to help provide four scholarships for Boxing Club participants and four for Freetown Community Center participants during each of the 8-week long summer art camps.

GREENVILLE JEWISH FILM FESTIVAL for the 2nd annual film festival weekend of screenings that embody Jewish culture and content.

GREENVILLE SHAKESPEARE COMPANY for a fully-realized, 75-minute production version of Shakespeare's As You Like It. The production included a free public performance at the Greenville County Museum of Art and a free dress rehearsal preview for community members with extreme physical disabilities.

GREENVILLE SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA for its annual Children's Concert supporting Greenville County Schools. The concert was free of charge, and the grant helped with the underwriting of bus fees for Title I schools.

GREENVILLE TECHNICAL COLLEGE VISUAL ARTS DEPARTMENT for the annual collaboration between the Greenville Tech Art Department and upstate high school art students and teachers. Entries to the exhibit are juried, and winners are selected by an accomplished professional artist

GREENVILLE THEATRE for a partnership between the theater and the Sterling School to bridge the two populations of Sterling and the Charles Townes Center through theater workshops and a collaborative performance.



One of the most anticipated events of the fall is Greenville Open Studios, MAC's signature event for the visual arts community held in November. Since 2002, 479 artists have participated in Open Studios, and each year offers new experiences for both the participating artists and those who visit the studios located within a 15-mile radius of downtown Greenville. In 2019, there were 24 new artists participating who added greatly to the artistic diversity of the weekend. Open Studios is the premier sales and marketing event for Greenville-area artists.

One unique feature of Greenville Open Studios is the app that was designed and implemented by Robojuice in 2018. In 2019, approximately 1,500 users downloaded the app to their desktops or phones. MAC will again offer the app for the event in 2020 and beyond.

In 2019, total sales were a record-high of \$376,022, and artists recorded 44,093 visits to the studios. Since 2004, over 620,000 visits have been recorded, and sales have totaled over \$3.8 million. The sales and attendance figures are also indicative of the talent and the professionalism of the visual artists living and working in Greenville.

SEW-Eurodrive of Lyman, SC was a presenting sponsor for the twelfth consecutive year, and we welcomed South State Bank as a presenting sponsor for the third year. The Peace Center joined as a presenting sponsor for the second time. These three entities' generous support was a major factor in the success of Open Studios. A big thank you to Mike Coggins and Matt Cotner of South State Bank; to Juergen, Christopher and Rainer Blickle of SEW-Eurodrive; and to Megan Riegel of the Peace Center for being such outstanding advocates of Open Studios.

Held June 14-15, 2019, the tenth annual Flat Out Under Pressure is a unique collaboration between the visual arts and sound environmental practices. The event begins with a 24-hour juried art-making competition. The selected winners are then given the opportunity to choose two images of their work for reproduction on the downtown recycling bins. The winning artists also receive cash prizes, and the first-place winner gets a week-long trip for two to Italy to stay in the beautiful Villa Sant' Andrea.

This year, 107 artists came to MAC on Friday, June 14 to get their surfaces officially stamped. The same surfaces were then returned to MAC within 24 hours as works of art. The works were juried that afternoon with an awards reception held the evening of June 15. All submitted works were displayed in the MAC Gallery for a month-long exhibition.

Arts Integration in Greenville County Schools

SmartARTS is MAC's successful arts education initiative that provides Greenville County Schools with teaching artists, art supplies and arts integration training to facilitate arts-integrated units in the classroom. SmartARTS goals include: (1) training new teachers each year in the planning and use of successful arts integration methods, (2) pairing SmartARTS teaching artists with teachers and providing support for planning rigorous units and (3) implementing, documenting and assessing units that are inquiry-based and highly experiential to encourage career-ready creative problem-solving by students.

In collaboration with Greenville County Schools (GCS), these inquiry-rich, standards-based units illuminate the authentic connections between academics and the arts, so student learning and teacher practices are enriched. SmartARTS began in 2002 with three US Department of Education grants to work in one struggling, high-poverty middle school. Now, 17 years later, students across Greenville County are benefiting from arts-rich education that helps students become college and career ready for the 21st century. The partnership between MAC and GCS remains strong as SmartARTS spreads the arts integration methodology to new educators each year and continues to mentor veteran educators.

The SmartARTS program continues to thrive due to the consistent support by the Greenville area philanthropic and business communities. In 2019, our exciting partnership with TD Bank and the TD Charitable Foundation continued with the TD Center for

"I had several classes that were almost all boys, and I wanted them to tap into their inner feelings," teacher Leila Moore said. Teaching reading and special education to sixth through eighth-graders at League Academy, she needed a way to engage her classes in learning about poetry. "I chose to have a creative writer come to my class to help introduce the writing concept of poetry," she says. "I was pretty sure this was not going to be a well-received project with my students." But to her surprise, the students fell in love with the loud, vibrant teaching artist. "The students thought he was cool, and that was half the battle," Moore says. "by the end of the unit, the boys were writing poetry. They were laying their souls open for all to hear." Culminating in a poetry slam, the students relayed deep understanding and feeling through spoken art.

Arts Integration established in 2016 with a corporate donation of \$200,000. We are also grateful to TD Bank; the TD Charitable Foundation, the Graham Foundation; the Jolley Foundation; George, Gordon & John Caughman in memory of Dr. Martha R. Roland H. Engeler Family. These individuals and business entities have been instrumental in ensuring the success of SmartARTS.

SmartARTS continually seeks funding in order to grow the program district-wide and to provide training to new teachers. 2019 was a record-setting year for SmartARTS with 86 arts-integrated units across 34 schools, up from 17 schools in the 2016-17 school year. Forty-four new teachers received SmartARTS arts integration training at our summer institute.

In a time when educators are under ever-increasing pressure but often have fewer resources, SmartARTS is a break-the-cycle program that offers innovative strategies for issues like poor academic performance,

apathy, disengagement and behavioral problems, as well as high levels of dissatisfaction among teachers, students and parents. According to new SC Gallup data, students in South Carolina's arts-rich schools outperformed the national mean. Research also showed a direct correlation between length of time as an arts-rich school and an increase in student engagement and hope. SmartARTS is thrilled to be a partner in creating arts-rich schools across Greenville County.









Special education students created tape sculptures of themselves to talk about their sense of self as well as their hobbies. The sculptures were displayed around Sterling School.

Devin Moore, who teaches second grade at Summit Drive Elementary, noticed his students struggling to connect with social studies content relating to culture. But once pottery was added to the curriculum, things quickly changed. "Students carved cultural objects out of clay to create a pottery piece for our class totem pole," he said. "Students were able to share their piece with the class and tell what connections they had to the objects they chose." Devin Moore's students made personal connections in a tangible way from abstract concepts within the subject area. "I believe their learning has deepened as a result of the SmartARTS integration, I am very excited about continuing this unit in the future."

ARTISPHERE 2019 marked the 15th anniversary of Artisphere presented by TD Bank. To commemorate the anniversary, Artisphere commissioned world-renowned sculptor Blessing Hancock to create *Spindle*, an illuminated aluminum steel sculpture installed in the Village of West Greenville. The sculpture pays homage to the area's rich textile history. The festival welcomed tens of thousands of locals and visitors pumping a record-high of \$9.1 million into the local economy and setting a record of \$9,930 for average artist sales for a total of \$1.34 million. In 2019, Artisphere donated another \$20,000 to its Arts Partners volunteers bringing the grand total to \$275,000 since the festival's inception. In its 15-year history, Artisphere has awarded over \$550,000 in scholarships, stipends, awards and contributions to local artists and non-profit organizations.

CAROLINA BALLET THEATRE In 2019, CBT served a variety of professional performances at the Peace Center and fundraisers including: Cinderella, Sleeping Beauty, The Nutcracker: Once Upon a Time in Greenville and Black & Beautiful. This ballet honored Black History Month and African American dancers that have helped shape the organization's dance landscape.

CENTRE STAGE 2019 offered an exciting assortment of productions and events that allowed the theatre to continue to captivate audiences, cultivate artistry and inspire community collaboration. The theatre kicked the year off with another hit "rock show" with the 50's and 60's themed *Shaboom Shaboom*. The spring of 2019 allowed for an experiential mounting of *Into The Woods* and the beloved production of *Driving Miss Daisy*. The crowd favorite, *Noises Off*, wowed patrons with a 360° degree revolving set. Centre Stage saw continued success and expansion within its Cabaret Benefit Series which continues to see growing support from the Upstate's top vocal talent and dining destinations.

GLOW LYRIC THEATRE is the only professional opera, operetta and musical theatre company in South Carolina. Currently undergoing its 10th Anniversary season, GLOW produces musical works that are in direct response to the social and political climate of the Upstate, and it strives to be a leader in utilizing music and theatre for social justice. In its 2019 season of *Herstory*, a brand new musical, *The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*, *My Fair Lady* and *Carmen*, GLOW illuminated the effect of sex trafficking, domestic abuse and poverty on women in South Carolina. In 2019, GLOW hired 125 musicians, actors, technicians and designers, serving almost 10,000 audience members. It provided tickets to 200 families undergoing hardship. Connecting their mission to the community, GLOW partnered with four prolific non-profits in the Greenville community that led pre-show lectures and post-show panel discussions.

GREENVILLE CENTER FOR CREATIVE ARTS (GCCA)

Since GCCA opened in 2015, the art school has attracted more than 2,300 students for classes and workshops. Hundreds of scholarships have enabled students of all ages and income levels to participate in camps and classes, and over 300 local, regional and national artists have participated in exhibitions. On August 16, 2019, *The New York Times* featured Greenville as a city that has "emerged as a buzzy destination for the culinary and creative arts after years of economic growth and urban revitalization. The article cited GCCA as having a major impact on Greenville as a destination. GCCA will continue to increase its impact by supporting artistic experiences that open the door to a lifetime of enrichment.

GREENVILLE CHAUTAUQUA SOCIETY In 2019, Chautaugua's

History Comes Alive celebrated its 21st season with It's Revolutionary! by stepping back in time to join the various Revolutions in American history. Chautauqua created an empire with Napoleon, dueled wits with Alexander Hamilton, debated democracy with Andrew Jackson, fought for human rights with Malcolm X, witnessed the end of Camelot with Jackie Kennedy and like Hamilton's women – they all were a part of the story. In the 2018–19 season Greenville Chautauqua presented 55 events for an audience of 14,106. And virtually all events were free.

GREENVILLE CHORALE 2019 was a banner year for the Chorale – performing choral masterworks such as Mozart's enigmatic *Requiem* and Bach's *Magnificat*. The organization nurtured new voices through guest performances by the Rushingbrook Children's Choir and the Young Artists Program. It also presented popular community traditions like the Christmas concert and free patriotic performance – all to enlivened audiences. The Chorale's 24-voice, professional Herring Chamber Ensemble also had a great year, presenting a selection of contemporary works by Eric Whitacre, Kim Arnesen, Jake Runestad and Greenville's own Dan Forrest during its Winter Concert. The Chorale received invitations to perform at Kiawah Island and in Greenwood. SC.

GREENVILLE COUNTY MUSEUM OF ART Home to the

world's largest public collection of Andrew Wyeth watercolors, the GCMA presented *Andrew Wyeth: Eight Decades*, which featured more than 30 of the artist's works, arranged chronologically, allowing viewers to see how Wyeth revisited themes and subjects across his long and prolific career. In the exhibition, *Art and Artists of South Carolina*, visitors experienced the moving and powerful work of enslaved potter David Drake; the challenging work of America's most acclaimed living artist Jasper Johns; the breadth of European modernism as adapted by African-American artist William H. Johnson; and the realistic and dramatic portrayals of South Carolina wild fowl by sculptor Grainger McKoy. Drawn from its permanent collection, the GCMA also presented several themed exhibitions, including *How About Pleasantburg?*, *Persons of Interest*, and *Masterclass: Watermedia from the Greenville Collection*

GREENVILLE SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA (GSO) The GSO's

72nd concert season saw the launch of an all-new program, *Friday Night Chamber Chats* which made its debut with the inaugural Chamber Orchestra Series concert, *Beethoven, Bach & Beer.* Immediately after Friday night Chamber performances, audience members were invited to stay and participate in a lively, interactive discussion with a select panel of two to three GSO musicians. This unique forum offered interested patrons the opportunity to get to know the musicians on a more personal level. Further expanding its numerous partnerships, the GSO forged a new collaboration with the South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities and the Greenville Center for Creative Arts in conjunction with a Masterworks Series performance. The concert featured a multimedia presentation of stunning artwork inspired by Stravinsky's *The Firebird Suite.* These strategic associations are integral to the success and continued expansion of the GSO's education and community engagement initiatives.

GREENVILLE THEATRE (GT) Last season, Greenville Theatre entertained over 83,000 theatre goers with critically acclaimed and popular productions that included *Oliver, Catch Me If You Can, Newsies* and *The Game's Afoot*. Beyond the mainstage, Greenville Theatre is home to Greenville Theatre on Tour, the theater's educational outreach program comprised of six professional, resident actors who perform over 100 performances on location, reaching more than 35,000 students each school year. Its educational programming expanded this year and now includes a weekly performance-oriented class held at the Sterling School and Charles Townes Center. Greenville Theatre also launched Junior Players, a troupe of 10-15 year-olds who meet at the theatre twice a week.

INTERNATIONAL BALLET In 2019, Executive Director Lena Forster retired and was named President and Founder by the Board of Directors. Sarah Shoemaker became the new Executive Director. Renovations were completed on a new 10,000 square-foot rehearsal space, named in honor of Greta and Graham Somerville. The new facility features the Halsey Studio, in honor of Jack and Sandy Halsey, and a second rehearsal studio, yet to be named. International guest star Sebastian Vinet appeared with the company in main stage productions. Other guest artists included Cara Marie Gary and Edson Barbosa of the Joffrey Ballet and Taras Domitro, formerly of the San Francisco Ballet. International Ballet continues to partner with the Greenville County Library and Thrive Upstate for outreach classes and performances, in addition to continuing to serve as an arts partner organization for Artisphere.

PEACE CENTER In its 2018-2019 season, the Peace Center welcomed more than 360,000 people to 700 events. The Broadway Series brought nine shows directly from New York to the Upstate, including the highlyanticipated *Hamilton*. World-renowned comedians, musicians and dance ensembles like Jeanne Robertson, Vince Gill and Dance Theatre of Harlem showcased their skills on the stage. Peace Talks, Poetic Conversations, Peace Interlude music appreciation series, master classes, workshops and book discussions offered free, enhanced experience opportunities. 51 energetic and aspiring teen performers were welcomed to the inaugural two-week Peace Studio: Broadway summer camp. The Peace Passport Field Trip Series continued to inspire students, and in 2019, teachers were able to directly connect the experience back to the classroom through curriculum resource guides and student worksheets. The Peace Center expanded its partnership with the Fine Arts Center, giving voice and jazz students the opportunity to perform in a professional environment in the heart of downtown

SOUTH CAROLINA CHILDREN'S THEATRE (SCCT) SCCT'S

33rd Season has been one of exciting change. The high-stepping, energy-packed *Ella Enchanted* opened the season in September, followed by Charles Schulz's *A Charlie Brown Christmas*. The C.S. Lewis classic *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* followed, and in March, SCCT's recently-named Co-Artistic Director Matt Giles will officially join the team and will direct the final SCCT show to be produced as a resident company of the Peace Center – *Curious George: The Golden Meatball*. In July 2020, SCCT will produce its final show of the 33rd season on its very own stage. Dr. Seuss' *The Cat in the Hat* will open in July, 2020. SCCT continues to serve the children of South Carolina by producing high quality theatre experiences, year-round educational programming and accessible outreach opportunities for all ages.

THE WAREHOUSE THEATRE In its 45th Anniversary season, the theatre tackled an ambitious season ranging from the world premiere of *Power of Sail*, Pulitzer Prize-winning *Sweat*, raucous re-boots of our fan favorites *The Rocky Horror Picture Show* and *Christmas on the Rocks* and a fresh take on Tennessee Williams' classic *The Glass Menagerie*. Continuing into the summer, The Warehouse Theatre was thrilled to present the 25th Anniversary Season of The Upstate Shakespeare Festival featuring *Romeo and Juliet* and *The Tempest*. The Festival is always free and open to the public, and it provides arts access directly to the community with 9,000+ audience members annually in Falls Park. The Warehouse Theatre Education and Community Engagement programs reached over 7,000 participants during the 2018-2019 season with 240 workshops, serving 110 schools in 144 classrooms, and 12 community partners.

CAMPAIGN FOR THE ARTS

The Campaign for the Arts (CFA) had a record-breaking year in 2019, raising an all-time high of \$1,227,221 and surpassing \$1 million for the third consecutive year. This total represents an increase of 9.5% over the 2018 total of \$1,120,989. Funds from the CFA continue to raise awareness of and develop audiences for MAC's cultural partners, the individual artists and arts organizations throughout Greenville County. Participants who gave at least \$50 received an ArtCard, entitling them to buy-one-get-one-free tickets for one time at each of the following: Centre Stage, Greenville Chorale, Greenville Theatre, Greenville Symphony Orchestra, Peace Center, South Carolina Children's Theatre and The Warehouse Theatre. The



ArtCard is an outstanding vehicle for residents and newcomers to sample Greenville's many cultural events at a significant savings. The ArtCard will be offered again in 2020.

MAC Endowment for the Arts

In 2010, the MAC Board of Directors established an endowment for the organization's grants program with 5% of all unrestricted income raised in 2009. The endowment has been funded annually at this rate in addition to major contributions. The purpose of the endowment is to ensure that MAC's constituencies of individual artists, arts organizations and arts educators can be funded at the highest level possible through the grants program. With public funding for the arts becoming more and more precarious and private funding becoming increasingly competitive, MAC must remain focused on future funding to sustain Greenville's diverse array of cultural assets.

At the 2013 MAC Annual Meeting, MAC embarked on a \$25 million, multi-year endowment campaign exclusively for its grants program. No percentage of either the corpus or the earnings of the endowment can be used for any other MAC initiative, thus ensuring the continued success of the grants program and the sustainability of the support MAC provides to its constituents.

In 2016, the endowment crossed the \$1 million mark. As of December 31, 2019, the endowment had a balance of \$1,800,692 in cash and pledges. The MAC Endowment for the Arts is overseen by a committee of seven people; two of them are members of the MAC Board of Directors, and three of them are experienced financial and fund-raising specialists. The MAC Executive Director and Board Chairman serve as ex-officio members.


